
Welcome & introduction





Security

Because of increased security concerns in the last year, we set up a small task force to better understand this issues and what we can do about it as a residents association. We kicked off two things in the fall.

- Ran a security walk with residents and Division 51 police officers
- Ran a **security survey** of residents to better understand what people are experiencing and their concerns.

Security Walk

114 respondents from our catchment area

- Significant enough to have some useful data
- Responses received may be biased towards people who have had a security incident

Thanks to all those who responded -- this was very helpful to us.

What is your biggest safety concern?

- 32% Personal Safety
- 28% Break-ins/Thefts
- 13% Violent Crime/Shootings
- 10% Other
- 8% Drugs
- 8% Blank
- 2% No/Little Concern

- your home 55% of all respondents
- car(s) **73**% of car owners
- bicycle(s)55% of bicycle owners

Residents who are reporting incidents to the police: 72%

Why are they not reporting?

- The police wouldn't do anything
- It was my fault for leaving something out or the door open/unlocked
- It's not serious enough to report


Residents who reported incidents who heard back from police: 33%

- In most cases it was following up to get more information on a serious incident
- In very few cases was there any report on the status or conclusion of the cases

Security - Car Vandalism

Great example of leveraging the CRA.

Security - Gun related crime

We have seen an increase in gun related incidents in the neighbourhood.

Concerns by residents is what originally encouraged us to set up a task force, run the Security Walk, the run a Security Survey, and improve our communications with 51 Division.

Gun related crime has become worse in the recent months and we need to double our efforts and coordinate with the City and the police on how to improve the situation.

- Next year we will coordinate with our Riverdale Park cleanup with them.






New Residents Welcome


